Approval has been granted by Los Angeles Airways, Inc., to est tablish the helicopter pickup and delivery service of mail and prop-erty between Los Angeles Muni-cipal airport and harbor, and Orange County effice. When test flights were being conducted by the U. S. Army last year, a landing area was prepared opposite the National Supply Co. plant on Carson st. near Abalone ave, but this has been utilized for commercial pur-poses. There are many other sites available for landing of the helicopters, all within a short dis-tance of the postoffice, Conner stal.


