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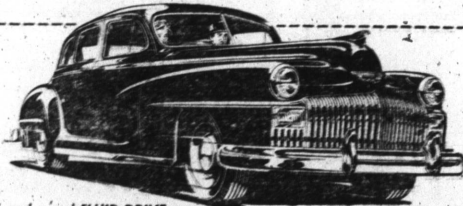
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SCIENCE LECTURE TO BE BROADCAST

Bids Received For Alondra Park's New Lake

At the Tuesday meeting of the board of supervisors, 10 bids were received for the construction of an artificial lake at Alondra Park, to be known as Lake Alondra; the low bid being for \$19,450 by the Spicer Co. of Los Angeles, and the high bid being for \$31,775, according to Raymond V. Darby, chairman. All bids were referred to the chief engineer for analysis and recommendation for award of contract. At the same meeting, and involving county land in the same area, the board of supervisors adopted an ordinance amending the Gardena-Hawthorne residence ordinance to prohibit oil drilling within 500 feet of any dwelling instead of 300 feet. Supervisor Darby announced.
