Youths To Canoe Down Sacramento River Next Week

Early Sunday morning two 20-year-old Torrance lads will embark on a 350-mile trip down the Sacramento river in a 17-foot canoe.

Bert Smith, of 1608 Hickory ave. and Lamar Watson, of 2454 Torrance blvd., have planned the trip since last summer. They will leave Torrance Friday and transport the canoe, an all-aluminum production, to Redding, California, the farthest northern point on the stream with no obstructions.

They will attempt to travel down the river past Sacramento into San Francisco bay. The distance from Redding to Sacramento by river is 242 miles, and the whole trip will take approximately six days.

Neither of the two "adventurers" is an experienced canoeist, but both are highly confident of making the trip without mishap.

Smith is transferring from the University of California at Berkeley this year, where he has been a student for the past year and a half, to U.C.L.A., where he will study Business Administration and Foreign Trade.

GEORGIA ETNA HUNTER

JAMES ORRIN BISHOP
Services for James Orrin Bishop, of 2921 Carson st., who died at Harbor General hospital Saturday, were conducted from Stone & Myers chapel Tuesday, Rev. Paul Moore Wheeler officiating. Born in Los Angeles Feb. 27, 1892, Mr. Bishop had lived in Torrance since 1918 and was employed as a master mechanic at the National Supply Co. Supreme Court Decision On Offshore Oil Deposits Affects Torrance Area

While there has been no thought of drilling for oil off Torrance beach, and this community has taken no part in the contest between the State of California and the United States government over ownership of tideland oil deposits, the interests of this city are involved in the decision of the Supreme court Monday.

The Supreme court held that the State of California is not entitled to the three-mile marginal bed along its coast, and that the Federal government is owner of the vast undersea oil deposits involved.

Torrance has a mile beach, between Palos Verdes Estates and Redondo Beach, affected by the decision.

However, the effect of the decision is of vital interest to such communities as Long Beach, Wilmington, San Pedro, Huntington Beach, Ellwood, in Santa Barbara County, and Rincon, in Ventura County, where the General Petroleum Corp. has numerous producing wells drilled from piers to oil deposits beneath the ocean.

The 6 to 2 decision of the Supreme court is based on the need for "a government next to the sea" to be able to protect itself from dangers incident to its location. It upholds the Justice department's contention that the 13 original colonies did not own the marginal belt "even if they did acquire elements of the sovereignty from the English crown by their revolution against it."

California's contention that no legal controversy existed, save a "difference of opinion between federal and state officials," was denied by the court, which stated the conflicting claims over which authority had a "superior right."
