

Student Vets **Should Check Pay Benefits**

J. G. Caldwell, director, Torrance Area Veterans Service Center, today warned student veterans to check their eligibility carefully before applying for readjustment allowances when their school term ends.

Under the law, Caldwell said, no veteran is eligible for readjustment allowance for any period for which he is being paid a GI subsistence allowance.

If for any reason a veteran receives double benefits, the veteran will face the prospect of refunding the money illegally received. In addition, the law prescribes that any further rights to readjustment allowances will be canceled if the veteran accepts such an allowance to which he knows he is not entitled.

Caldwell emphasized that even if a student veteran is not receiving subsistence pay he may not meet all the eligibility requirements for readjustment allowances. Such allowances are intended only for veterans who are ready and willing to enter civilian occupations.

The veteran who seeks employment for temporary periods between terms sharply limits his availability and choice of jobs, according to State Department of Employment regulations, and therefore may not be considered eligible for the readjustment pay on the same basis as other unemployed veterans.

Veterans may check their rights and seeune advice on their GI Bill benefits at Torrance Area Veterans Sevice Center, located at 1339 Post, avenue.
