The girl, through her guardian, C. S. Rugraff, complained that the dentist permitted the instrument to slip into her throat and later it lodged in her lung necessitating an operation.

Everybody involved will probably be one year older when the outcome is known, as the case has been continued to Feb. 10, 1948, in Superior court.

**Charge Against Peace Disturber Backfires Here**

A complaint filed by a couple living in a Torrance hotel against a neighbor for disturbing the peace, backfired this week.

It seems the couple were living together without the benefit of marital rites.

The incident started when the neighbor became abusive to the woman, both in speech and action, and the couple promptly filed a complaint with the local police.

In retaliation, the neighbor filed an answering complaint against the couple for violation of the rooming house ordinance.

In City Court they were fined \$25 each.

The disturber of the peace will face his charge Friday.

The disturbed couple stated that they will testify, but the judge warned them that they had better provide separate legal addresses prior to appearance.

**V. A. CEMETERY BURIAL RIGHTS ARE CLARIFIED**

Veterans who die in Army, Navy or private hospitals under contract to provide medical treatment for Veterans Administration patients are not entitled to burial in VA cemeteries except in cases where the bodies are unclaimed or relatives cannot be located. L. C. Chapman, Veterans Administration regional manager, announced here today.

To clarify a recent change in regulations which states that only veterans who die in VA hospitals or homes are eligible for burial in VA cemeteries, Chapman explained that this means only those hospitals and homes under the direct and exclusive jurisdiction of VA. Therefore, veterans who die in contract hospitals are not eligible except in cases where the bodies are unclaimed or relatives cannot be located.

In the Los Angeles regional area, Chapman stated, VA now has the following contract arrangements: Long Beach Naval hospital, 425 beds; Corona Naval hospital, 225; Army McCornick General hospital in Pasadena, 50 and approximately 40 VA patients are now cared for by private tuberculosis sanitariums in Monrovia.

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**Grand Opening Of New Trailer Park Tonight**

The grand opening of the new Torrance Trailer Park at 1820 Torrance blvd., will take place tonight at the new establishment at 7:30, according to Sam Goldfaden, owner and operator.

The new trailer park is one of the most modern units of its type on the west coast, with every possible convenience for its occupants.

It will be equipped with all new, tile finished rest rooms and showers, together with automatically controlled air conditioning.

The forty-three spaces for trailers have concrete slabs for the trailers and each space is furnished with its own utilities, the park having its own power plant.

The modern office also contains individual mail boxes for each trailer space, affording each occupant his own private mail delivery.

The public is invited to visit and inspect the new installations at an open house scheduled at the grand opening tonight.

**Hawthorne Must Replace Recalled City Officials**

Voters of Hawthorne will hold a special election within 45 days to elect successors to three municipal officials recalled Thursday.

Mrs. Emily Riley, city clerk, apparently had staved off recall by seven votes in the unofficial tally.

Recalled were: Mayor Walter Hawley, 1151 to 915; Councilman Wilbur Long, 1231 to 820, and Councilman Clarence Wilbanks, 1165 to 893.

Mrs. Riley's opponents polled only 1017 votes, while 1024 voted against recall.

The election was the result of a political revolt against incumbent officials which has been smoldering for several months, and followed a turbulent council meeting six weeks ago when Police Chief M. R. Baumgardner was demoted to sergeant by the council, which elevated Lt. Edward J. Parker to the chief's position. Baumgardner, contesting the action, refused to resign as chief.

**CONSTRUCTION MOSHOS MEDICAL BUILDING BEGUN**

Construction on the new 60x70 foot Medical Building of Dr. Don C. Moshos, at 1617 Cravens ave., was begun this week with the clearing of the ground.

The one-story building will be constructed of brick and stucco and will cost approximately \$18,000, according to Building Department records.

The permit was issued for the building last November.
