## Aerial Demonstrations Slated For Tomorrow's Air Force Day Exhibit

Southern Californians will be watching the skies tomorrow as the Army Air Force celebrates the fortieth anniversary of its founding.

Many activities will be conducted nationally but the real emphasis of the Air Force Day program tomorrow will be in the cities and towns of America. Nearby fields will send formations winging over Southern California in exhibitions of aircraft and flying equipment. Demonstrations are planned at various army installations where open house will be held.

"Air Power is Peace Power" is the theme for this year's program. Aimed to acquaint each citizen with the significance of a strong air force, the celebrations attempt to show air power as an effective instrument of world peace. They also aim to stress the responsibility of the American people in supporting an adequate air force and explain the vital need for a continuing program of air research and development.

General Carl Spaatz, commanding general, Army Air Forces, stated, "In cooperation with private industry and other governmental agencies, we have mapped a program of research and development to insure the continuation of our contributions to civilian aviation and to the national security."

"Above all we need widespread public support and understanding by all the American people of the fact that weakness in the air is a national weakness."

## Los Angeles Must Reinstate G.H.S. Junior Secretary

The Superior court has ordered the Los Angeles Board of Education to reinstate Mary T. Ahlstedt, 1542 West 102nd St., dismissed October 23, 1943, as junior secretary of Gardena High school.

Supt. Vierling Kersey said Mrs. Ahlstedt was fired for incompetence after a series of transfers.

Mrs. Ahlstedt brought suit against the Board for reinstatement on the ground that the proper procedure had not been employed in dismissing her from service.

Under the court order she will receive accumulated back pay of \$9100.

Harold Ryan, who has been assisting veterans in the Harbor area for the past year in the preparation and presentation of their claims for various benefits administered by the VA, is to be withdrawn from such service at the close of business July 31, 1944.

Recent VA decision set forth the necessity of withdrawing its personnel from all Veteran Service centers to maintain adequate personnel performance in the sub-regional office at Long Beach.

Ryan wishes to acknowledge and thank the various agencies in the Harbor area and in particular the Veterans' Service centers, who have been a great assistance to him and to the many veterans he served. He will begin his duties at the Long Beach office in the Times building beginning Aug. 1, 1944.

The Veterans Service centers in the Harbor area will continue to remain open daily Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. There will be no curtailment of services because of the above change, according to James E. Caldwell, director of the Torrance-Lomita area Veterans Service Center.
