LEGION TOURNAMENT GOES INTO FINAL STAGE AS TOP SQUADS VIE FOR TITLE

The 1947 Southern California Semi-pro baseball tournament swung into the final round this week with only four remaining teams to battle for the championship.

The annual tourney sponsored by the Bert S. Crossland Post No. 170 of the American Legion, has seen some hard fought contests in these final stages.

The Trojans smashed out a 7-5 victory over the Kelman Electric squad Tuesday evening to oust the Kelman nine from play in a hard hitting scramble. Wally Hood was the winning hurler for the Dedeaux gang, fanning 12 Kelman batsmen.

The Oilers advanced to the final round by virtue of an 8-3 win over Tillie Schaffer and Alloyd Diercraft Monday night. (See story.)

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Cross Channel Aquaplane Race To Be Sept. 7

For the first time since 1941, the 44-mile cross channel aquaplane race between Santa Catalina and the three south Santa Monica Bay communities of Hermosa, Redondo and Manhattan will be resumed this year on September 7, Association President Frank Champagne announced last night. It will be the ninth running of the national championship "Ironing Board Derby."

In its initial resumption, the race, only one of its kind in the world, will be "scratch" with all boats and riders leaving the island in a simultaneous running start.

Surveyors, he said, are now laying out a new course, starting from Seal Rocks, south of Avalon, sweeping along the island lee into the bay at Avalon and from there straight across the channel to Rocky Point, south of Redondo Beach. Racers will complete the course in front of the three South Bay communities, with the finish at Hermosa Beach.

Length of the course will remain unchanged and all riders will be shooting at the world record of one hour and fifteen minutes for the distance, set by Bob Brown, rider, Don Berry, driver in 1939.

The course will be charted and patrolled by Division Three of the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary, under the command of Captain Ben Wright. Capt. Wright and his command have been on the Catalina channel for the past three weeks, preparing for the race.

Tartar Football Prospects Viewed As Season's Opening Draws Near

Torrance might well be the dark horse of the Bay League if Coach Eddie Cole can develop the morale, spirit and playing ability to last season's stature.

The former OceanSide Junior big squad with plenty of depth will need a sharp passer. The Red and Gray forward wall will be built around Jack Hood, 150-lb. captain and right end. Little Jack was named on the second team All-Marine league last season for his great play on both defense and offense. Teamed with Hood to give the Tartars two strong flankers may be Bob Jones, 6 ft. 2 in., 200-lb. shot punter. Bob played good ball as a reserve last fall. He has amazing speed for a man his size, but to get the starting call must edge out Johnny Branum, Gilbert Avalos and Keith Pearson, three rangy lettermen, as well as a host of newcomers.

Tackles will again be a strong point in the Tartar line. Gene Stirling, 6 ft., 200-lb. All-City bruiser with speed to burn, will probably be teamed with massive Doug Woolver, 256-lb. bonerasher, who also played a lot of great ball last season. Another strong contender for the starting nod will be Jack Wallis, 180-lb. letterman. Onal Harris and Don Garrison, two scrappers up from the Bees should supply the reserve strength.

Leading some 11 candidates for the call at the guards are Dick Oefinger, a letter winner who tips the scales at 180 lbs. and Albert Stevenson, 200 lb. 6 ft. 1 in. letterman tackle who may be shifted to add strength down the middle. Another strong contender is Bill Carlton, 256 lb., 6 ft. 2 in. giant who lacks experience but learns rapidly. John Schulz, a letterman, and 215 lb. Bob Denty give reserve strength along with Bill Domagala, Bill Carstens and Corky Donnel, Bee lettermen.

Eddie Fortin, last season's number one center, returns to give the Tartars a pivotman with plenty of know how. Backing up Fortin will be Pete Douroux, a Bee letter winner.

Coach Eddie Cole will greet a host of experienced backs led by Bullet Bill Morgan. Morgan was the Tartar's ace sprinter during the last track season and has power and savvy to go with his blazing speed. As well as being a fine blocker is bearcat on defense, Tom Faren, 180 lb. All-Leaguer, gives the Tartars a smashing fullback and assures them of a worthy line-backer.

The return of Jack Taylor means the Tartars will have a long-distance punter and another strong runner. Three other leading contenders for the starting backfield assignments are: Dick Turner, Frank Faren and Mike Goetsch. Turner is an experienced T quarterback. Faren is a bruising fullback and Goetsch a speedy halfback. All are up from the Bees. Jack Koshak, another letterman, is also a contender at half. A new entry from the east, Dick Ruppert, might be the answer to mentor Cole's passing worries. Dick has had experience mastering the T in high school back here. Harry Theodos, ace hurler from the baseball team, will be out for football and hopes to match his diamond form.

All in all the material looks better than average, but such factors as entering a new league, getting a new coach, starting out under a new school setup, must be considered. Confidence spirit should be greater than at any period in the past as evidenced by the strong support shown the new schools already.

Practice will start officially early in September and a practice game with Covina high school has been scheduled at Redondo Friday night, Sept. 26.

Saving Of Ducks And Crops Seen In Pond Program

Assemblyman Vincent Thomas is assisting the State Fish and Game Commission in the selection of from 20,000 to 40,000 acres of "flyways" or duck ponds which will be built for the joint purpose of protecting wild life of California and saving farmers' crops.

The job of picking the sites for the hundreds of "ponds" has been turned over to the Assembly Interim Committee on Fish and Game.

After arriving in Sacramento today, Assemblyman Thomas will leave with the committee to inspect sites picked out for the ponds. They will be on the route of the ducks as they have traveled between Canada and Central America during the past five years, and will constitute "game reserves."

The Federal government is matching the state in providing the "flyways" for ducks, and this will mean that many of them will be located on the public domain.

Because of the lack of feeding and watering places, the ducks traveling the length of California between Canada and Central America have damaged all types of crops, including rice, according to Thomas. Loss in the migrant wild-fowl life has resulted, he said.

The state has allowed \$3,000,000 for the project, and the over-all program will cost about \$6,000,000, according to Thomas.

The Assembly Interim Committee on Fish and Game will end its journey on Aug. 26, but will meet Aug. 18 in San Diego on a commercial fishing problem.

The committee will meet in San Pedro for one week at the end of this month, talking over problems of fish canners, sardine fishermen and others.

Lions Cub parents will drive up to witness the game and furnish transportation for the youngsters. Elmer "Red" Moon of the local recreation staff will also accompany the team in the capacity of coach.

It is expected that arrangements for a rematch of the four teams to play at Torrance will be made while the teams are at Oxnard.

Last year the boys' teams split their series. Oxnard winning a close one here by an 8-7 count and the local nine taking a return game 6-5 on the losers' field, both games being decided in the final inning.

Signing Of New Coach Announced By Redondo High

Walter F. "Walt" Jacobsmeier, Jr., former Riverside Junior College and University of Southern California star athlete, has been signed to the Seahawk coaching staff for the coming term. Russ Strif, director of athletics at Redondo Union High School, announced last week.

Hired to replace Harold Grant who resigned recently to accept a coaching post with the University of California at Berkeley, Jacobsmeier will be head baseball coach and assistant football mentor.

The new coach is a native of Riverside and a graduate of St. Francis DeSales High School there in 1940. He later competed in football, basketball, baseball and track at Riverside J. C., and made his varsity letter at University of Southern California in 1942 before entering the Army Air Forces.

At present Jacobsmeier is living in Los Angeles but is looking for a house in the South Bay area, as he will be married in September.

Superintendent W. K. Cobb said that the high school board of trustees approved Jacobsmeier's appointment at their meeting Monday.

State Department Of Fish And Game Issues Information For Hunters

Warnings for hunters to be extremely careful in the hills this year because of extreme fire hazards in practically all of the state and admonitions urging hunters to obtain permits from private land owners, or stay away from posted areas, characterized scattered reports from fish and game wardens to the California Division of Fish and Game.

The 40-day season for Black Tailed deer opened Aug. 7 in the coastal and the recently designated Southern California two deer areas.

Deer hunting apparently is ranging from poor to excellent. San Luis Obispo County offers excellent prospects, particularly in the Adelaide and Pozo areas. A recent night check near Adelaide revealed 180 deer, many of them legal bucks, in an area eight miles long and two miles wide. Old timers declare there are more deer this year in this area than they have seen in 50 years.

Bouquet Canyon is not living up to its reputation as the most promising area in Los Angeles County. Some bucks are available in the Chatsworth area, but hunters must obtain permission from ranchers to hunt as this is all private land. Fair hunting also is expected on the north slope of the Angeles Forest in the Sulphur Springs and Pinon Flat country and the open area in Refuge 4-B.

Bucks are reported to be fairly plentiful and in good condition in San Diego County, but a terrific fire hazard exists. Four serious fires already have occurred this summer and a recent blaze in the Laguna mountains drove many deer into the Laguna Refuge.

The Bureau of Patrol has issued a warning to the effect that the "accidental" slaughter of elk in the area will bring serious repercussions as the area is being heavily patrolled. Last season several head of elk were "accidentally" shot.

Orange County deer hunting prospects are blighted by the fire menace. The Cleveland National Forest is closed to trespass because of excessive fire hazards and Refuge 4-C, which was opened this year by the California Division of Fish and Game, lies within this area. The remaining hunting area lies on private lands, which the owners have closed to trespass.

Unless hunters have permits to hunt from private land owners, they are urged not to seek deer in San Jose County. Dry water holes and the danger of fire have caused ranchers to intensify their patrols and practically all of the hunting area is on posted, privately owned land.

Sonoma County reports indicate an excellent season in prospect. Deer are in splendid condition and fairly abundant. Hunters are urged to exercise caution with fire as the country is extremely dry.

There will be good hunting in western Sonoma and Marin counties for those having permits from land owners. There is virtually no open hunting in western Sonoma and Marin counties. The deer population is reported as being approximately normal.

Each report received at the office of the Division of Fish and Game urges deer hunters to be extremely careful this year with campfires, cigarettes, cigars, pipes and matches.

Hunters are urged to personally check with forestry officials in areas they intend to hunt, in view of the fact that farly emergency closures are anticipated because of extreme dryness this season.
