E. W. Johnston Directs Church Welfare Affairs

Erwin W. Johnston, of St. Joseph, Missouri, has accepted the position of director of the Church Welfare Bureau of the Church Federation of Los Angeles. It was announced yesterday by Dr. Paul C. Johnston, minister of Immanuel Presbyterian church and president of the Church Federation.

An ordained Presbyterian minister, Johnston is a graduate of McCormick Theological Seminary, Chicago, and the Chicago University School of Social Work. He has had 20 years of active experience in professional social work, chiefly in Chicago. For the past three years he has been director of the Family and Children's Bureau of St. Joseph, Mo. Mr. Johnston will take over his duties with the Church Welfare Bureau about October 1.

The Church Welfare Bureau is the social welfare department of the Church Federation Dr. Johnston stated further. The Bureau unites 34 Protestant health and welfare agencies into a single unit, enabling them to cooperate more effectively with other groups in the welfare field. In addition, the Bureau carries on a program of direct welfare services. These services include information and referral, Case Work and Group Work.

New Enlistees May Be Assigned In Nearby Area

An unusual opportunity for local veterans to cash in on new benefits offered by the Regular Army without leaving the Long Beach area is contained in a directive made public this week by Col. M. L. McCreary, chief of recruiting, Sixth Army, President of San Francisco.

Under terms of the directive, Army commanders are authorized to accept enlistments from men with prior service in any of the Armed Forces for initial assignment to any under-strength unit or installation of the veterans' choice within the Sixth Army. Of special interest to local veterans will be the vacancies in the 6004 Army Service Unit at Fort MacArthur.

The quota this month has been set at 11 men, according to the local Army recruiting station.

Military occupational specialties included in this quota are meat or dairy inspector, radiology technician, stenographer, classification specialist, clerk-typist, finance technician, X-ray technician, dental technician, medical laboratory technician, and others.

All interested veterans are urged to investigate without delay at the U. S. Army recruiting station located in the Chamber of Commerce bldg., Torrance.

Doctor From Philippines Visits Here

In order to study all phases of the public health program in Los Angeles County, Dr. Federico Florendo Jr., public health physician from the Philippines, will visit Torrance and other sections of the county, according to Dr. Kenneth H. Sutherland, assistant County Health officer.

Doctor Florendo is in the United States on a fellowship grant of the U. S. Public Health service for a years study of public health administration at Harvard university. Upon his return to the Philippines, he will be in the bureau of laboratories for the Department of Health and Public Welfare of the Philippine Republic.

The health officer's position as president of a sanitary district in the Philippines is comparable to that of the District Health officer in this county. He stopped off enroute to Harvard to study the County Health department's setup which is considered a model throughout the country.

Doctor Florendo's itinerary includes a study of all aspects of sanitation, maternal and child health, communicable diseases, as well as field trips to the Torrance Health Center. He also spent one afternoon last week as a guest of the Los Angeles Tuberculosis and Health association.

Churches Organize Interfaith Group To Handle Released Time Classes

Upon the call of the Torrance Ministerial Association, representatives of Torrance churches and faith groups met last week to organize a Torrance Interfaith Committee on Weekday Christian Education.

Officially represented on the committee are two Protestant groups, the Church Federation and the Evangelical Released-Time, Inc., and the Catholic church, represented by the Church of the Nativity, Torrance. Delegates from the Christian Science church were present at the meeting and were instructed that they may name an official representative if they decide to conduct released-time classes during the coming school term. Other faith groups, or churches, desiring to conduct such classes will be accorded the same privilege, according to the Rev. H. Wesley Roloff, pastor of the Central Evangelical United Brethren church, who was elected chairman of the Interfaith Committee and the official contact person with the schools.

Rev. Father P. J. McGuinness was elected vice chairman and the Rev. Clyde Ruckman, of the First Methodist church, was chosen as secretary-treasurer.
