The college will open September 29th. Money to defray costs of converting the AAF base in Rolling Hills into a modern college plant is being raised by contributions ranging from \$5.00 to \$1,000.00. Rep. Cecil R. King is motoring to California, vacationing enroute. Before he departed, the 17th district Congressman did not indicate when he expects to arrive in his district.

He said he expects to be in San Francisco by Sept. 8, when the Tollefson fisheries subcommittee of the House is scheduled to open hearings on the fishery provisions of the proposed Japanese peace treaty.

King is a member of the subcommittee, which will ask representatives of the west coast fishing industry for their viewpoints on the fishery provisions of the treaty.

The Californian, who was chairman of the bi-partisan caucus of western representatives named to investigate a shortage of box cars in the west, was unable to say when the findings of the committee would be announced.


