

This brought up discussion from Rippy, stating that city buses could be used to haul school children and thus eliminate the need for purchase of more school buses. He urged acquiring of buses at once.

Ploment reminded the group that the schools must buy, and that there is no revenue from school buses.

He said that the five-year lease purchase plan is legal for the schools and for municipalities, and Sears joined in this assertion.

Tolson was asked how many mew buses would be needed, and he replied that four at once and four in January.

He said: "It is my recommendation that we stay in the business and vote bonds to buy buses."
