2nd WAA Sale At Alcoa Plant To Be In November

Second unit of the dismantled Alcoa plant, 190th st. and Normandie Ave., to be offered for sale by War Assets Administration, will be sold as a unit to the highest bidder at 9 a. m., Friday, November 14.

The parcel consists of \$7,000,000 worth of electrical equipment for converting a 138,000-volt line current into 650 volts d.c. for electrolytic action among hot pots on the reduction line.

It includes transformers, rectifiers, switch gear and connections necessary for the gigantic operation of refining the aluminum used to supply Southern California's great wartime aircraft building industry.

Inspection is permitted from 9 a. m. to 3:30 p. m., from November 3 through November 17, except on Saturdays and Sundays. Priority claimants will be served according to existing regulations.

First unit of the Alcoa plant to be offered for sale by WAA consisted of the 640 carbon lined steel pots weighing more than 7500 tons, and with 35 tons of copper recoverable in bus bars. Acquisition cost to the government for this item was \$2,000,000. Bids received at the first sale on a scrap basis averaged around \$100,000 and were all rejected. The pots will be readvertised for sale as soon as possible, WAA said.

Employment Of Disabled Vets Discussed

Charity, pensions or special favors will never solve the employment problems of the disabled veterans, according to James G. Caldwell, chairman of the Torrance Area Employment Advisory committee.

An opportunity to earn a decent living because he is a capable worker is the only answer, said Caldwell, warning against offering a disabled person a job merely because of the disability.

In urging all employers to give disabled persons a chance to prove their capabilities on the job, Caldwell recommended that they contact the California State Employment Service in Torrance. The "selective placement" interviewer who has been trained to match job duties with the unimpaired abilities of handicapped persons will help select a disabled person who can do the job with satisfaction both to himself and to you.
