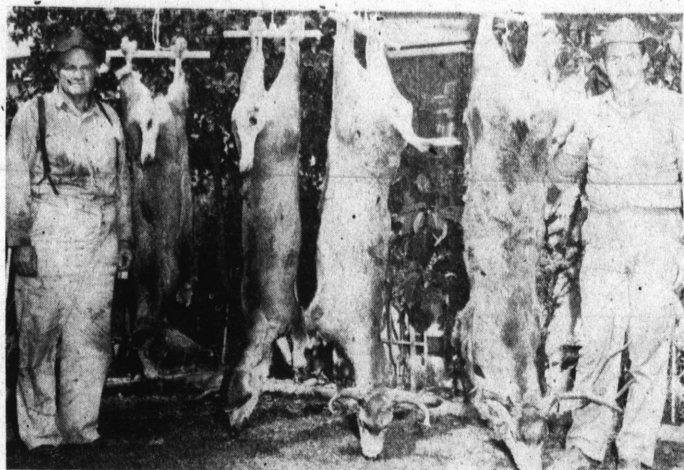
Opportunities For Jobs Here Remain Stable

Employment opportunities for women remain predominately in the clerical, service and domestic trades. An increase has been noted, however, in opportunities for women factory workers in establishments making toys for Christmas.

Sewer Trunk Line Bids To Be Asked Again

Bids will be called on Nov. 12 for the construction of a trunk line for the Waleria sewer district, according to a spokesman for the County Sanitation district.

Six bids received Sept. 10 were all rejected as being too high. Low bidder was Arthukovich Bros., with \$119,508. Since then, engineers said, the proposed line has been rerouted to run west on 238th st. to the western boundary of the Meadow Park tract and thence south to Pacific Coast highway.

Under the revised plan, engineers said they will install a shallow temporary line which will serve a smaller area than the original system, but will be "considerably cheaper." They added that as the territory develops, a deeper and permanent trunk will be laid.

Preliminary work is under way to form a sanitation district in the Waleria area to lay a distribution system in Waleria at an estimated cost of \$210,458. No starting date has been set for the Torrance project, however, said City Engineer Glenn M. Jain's office, since present plans must be revised to coincide with the proposed county changes.

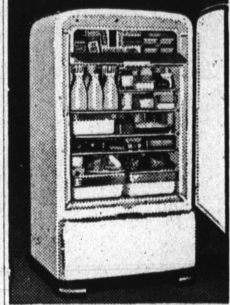

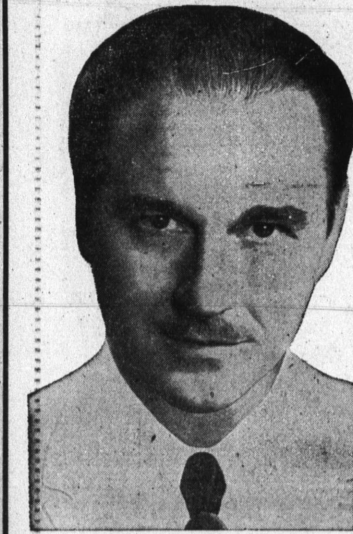

Present Water Fight Like Battles Of Frontier Days

Torrance and other Southern California communities interested in their rights as part of the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California should be intensely interested in the fight for water from the Colorado river now going on, leaders of the Colorado River Association said last week.

Water has always been the cause of fights in the western states, it was pointed out, although in the old days it was carried on with gun in sun-parched fields. Today, however, the battle to conserve Colorado river water is waged in state legislatures, Congress, and eventually, it is hoped, in the chamber of the Supreme Court itself.

Leaders in the fight to save Southern California's established rights in the Colorado river, explaining their reference to the Supreme Court, referred to the joint resolution introduced in Congress during the last session, which would authorize taking the Arizona-California water dispute to the high court for adjudication.

It is contended that no more legislation should be passed by Congress authorizing construction of water diversion works in the Lower Colorado River Basin until the Supreme Court has passed on the water dispute between Arizona and California.

At the present time the controversy between the two states centers around a Senate bill authorizing expenditure of more than \$1,000,000,000 for the so-called Central Arizona Irrigation project, and which proposes construction of a dam on the Colorado river above Hoover Dam.

More than \$600,000,000 of the total sum would be expended for the prior construction of a branch aqueduct to be built from Parker Dam. The water would be lifted 1,000 feet to join the ultimate aqueduct route part way to the Phoenix area.

Among the main points against the proposal, according to Colorado River Association officials, are that its sponsors propose that none of the capital cost shall ever be repaid by the Arizona land owners benefiting, thus placing an unjust burden on Southern California power users, and that not enough Colorado river water is available for such an irrigation system, when the established rights of operating projects are considered.

Ray F. Reel, 57 Local Teacher Passes Away

Ray Franklin Reel, 57, for many years widely known in Torrance as a principal and teacher, died last Thursday morning in the Culver City hospital following a heart attack earlier.

Reel was a native of Iowa, coming to Southern California about 20 years ago. He was a principal at the Perry school for several years and a teacher at Torrance elementary school during the current fall session.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Florence Reel; two daughters, Elaine and Beverly Reel and a son, Roger, all of the family residence, 4733 Campbell dr., Culver City; a sister, Mrs. Bessie Morris, of Akron, Ohio, and a brother, John Reel of San Gabriel, Calif.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday morning in the chapel of Edwards Brothers' Colonial mortuary, Los Angeles, and interment followed in Inglewood Park cemetery.

Liquor Banned At Schools

Action banning consumption of liquor on school grounds in Long Beach and other unincorporated areas has been taken by the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors Tuesday.

Chairman Raymond V. Darby, who has been earnestly endeavoring to bring about the adoption of an ordinance to stop drinking at public school sports events and festivities, told of his attendance at a high school football game where liquor was consumed in great quantities and the consequent behavior of those drinking liquor spoiled the enjoyment of those seated nearby.

"Aside from spoiling the afternoon for so many of us," the supervisor said, in calling for a motion to pass an ordinance, "the spectacle these people made of themselves was certainly not calculated to exert a good influence on the school children attending."
