New C.A.P. Unit Operates On Local Airport

A newly organized Civil Air Patrol group is starting operations on Torrance Municipal Airport, formerly Lomita flight strip, according to E. Y. Tarkington, Torrance city airport manager.

The 480-acre, Army-developed field, sold to the City of Torrance by the War Assets Administration, was the subject of recent litigation initiated by three Lomita businessmen and a "Torrance taxpayer," claiming to be members of the Civil Air Patrol.

Tarkington stated that the new C.A.P. group, at present, is using three planes, owned by G. A. Turner, of Hollywood, and is operating on a small scale at the field.
The airport manager stated that, as far as he knows, the new group has no affiliation with the Third Group, under C. H. Holmes, which was ordered inactivated and ordered from the field at the time Torrance took possession under Federal authority.

The City of Torrance has said that it desires that the legitimate Civil Air Patrol activities be carried out on the field, but opposed commercial activities carried on under the name of the patrol.

Redondo Beach Buses To Local District Okayed

Bus service at Seaside Ranchos by Sunset Stages has been authorized by the State Public Utilities Commission, it was learned today.
Sunset Stages also received the Commission's authorization to serve Redondo Union high school in Redondo Beach.
Torrance Municipal Bus Lines now run three schedules a day to Seaside Ranchos, and the service will be increased as soon as the two buses now enroute from the east to Torrance are received. The Torrance buses go into the center of the tract, while the Sunset buses from Redondo must remain outside.
