## 7-Year-Old Boy Killed In Hit, Run Accident

Charges of hit and run manslaughter in the death of a seven-year-old boy were filed against Edward C. Wright, 22427 Dolores avenue, in Justice Court Monday with a preliminary hearing before Judge John A. Shidler set for next Tuesday.

State highway patrolmen arrested Wright at his home Friday. The accident occurred Thursday night in front of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Hunt, 21224 South Main street, when the Hunt car was struck by another car in the fog.

Donald Hunt, 7, was pronounced dead on arrival at Harbor General hospital. Injured were his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hunt, and two other Hunt children, Ronald, 5 years, and Dennis, 5 months. Wright was said by patrolmen to have fled the scene on foot. He was traced through his abandoned car.

M. J. Strzelecki, Los Angeles, was arrested as a suspect shortly after the fatal accident following a second accident after his car also had hit the damaged Hunt car.

Although cleared in the death of the boy, Strzelecki was held on charges of felonious drunk driving in the second accident which occurred in front of 21032 South Main street when his car collided head-on with a car driven by C. E. Duffey, Long Beach. Mrs. Duffey was injured.

## SCRAP LACK HELD CAUSE OF SHORTAGE OF STEEL

Full production from the nation's 20,000,000 tons of scrap were expected this year, but are not being obtained because of the present inadequate supply of scrap. This is one of the prime reasons for the shortage of steel products. So stated H. W. Christensen, director of purchases for Columbia Steel Co., and chairman of the Joint Industries Committee for Expediting Scrap, who was summoned to Cleveland for an emergency session of some 30 sub-committees on scrap which was held in that city yesterday, Oct. 22.

Christensen said that the purpose of the meeting, which is being attended by representatives of the White House, the Army and Navy, the Maritime Commission and other government agencies, will be to devise ways and means to accelerate the marketing of government-owned surplus which may be turned into scrap.

The potential steel scrap in the San Francisco Bay area alone is approximately 350,000 tons, Christensen pointed out. If the government releases this material and it is promptly processed through the normal scrap industry channels, it would be enough to assure capacity operation of the West Coast steel industry for another six months.

Questioned as to the basic underlying causes for the critical scrap situation, Christensen said, "The natural reservoir of scrap was drained off during the war. This reservoir has not refilled. In fact, it is highly questionable whether it will ever again regain its former level."

"A second reason is that during the decade from 1930 to 1940,

20,000,000 tons of scrap were expected from this country. "Another is that during the war years, it is estimated that fully 140,000,000 tons of scrap or potential scrap was irretrievably lost in combat and through disposal abroad. It is also, estimated millions of tons of potential scrap are locked up in the abnormally large reserves of the armed forces, in merchant ships and government surpluses.

"This means," Christensen added, "that a minimum of 150 to 160 millions of tons of scrap has been drained from our industrial reservoir in less than two decades. This amount equals our nation's industrial requirements for six years of capacity operations."

Christensen said the current situation is particularly critical because of the consumption of purchased scrap is at a record breaking level while current scrap stocks throughout the nation are at the lowest level in history. He paid high tribute to the efforts of the scrap iron dealers who are combing the country for supplies but added that extraordinary efforts must be made if the steel industry is to continue maximum operations.
