## Audiometer Fund Grows

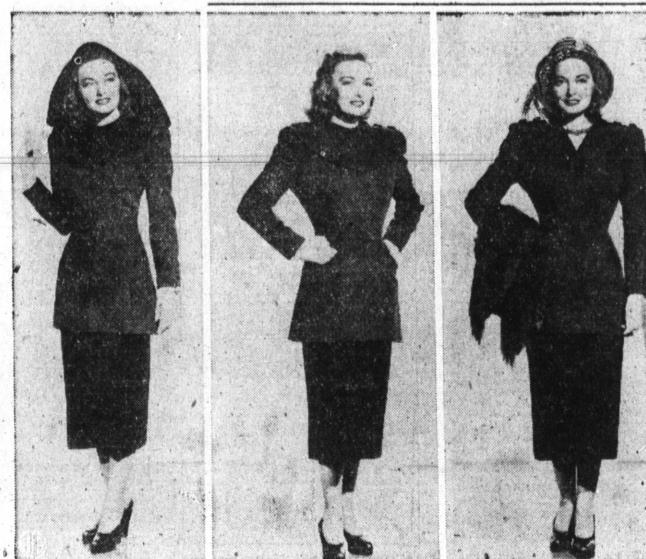

The Maico Audiometer, a device to test hearing, is portable model costing \$285 and it is very badly needed in the schools, according to Mrs. Boyle.

Torrance students will be able to receive treatment at the clinic in San Pedro provided that they first have been tested with the audiometer, she explained. There has not been one available for use in Torrance schools since they changed from the Los Angeles system.

Fresh, frozen and canned products are available in generous amounts. The selection of an extra vegetable for any meal will be simple.

**HONEY ONIONS**  
12 medium onions  
Salt and pepper  
1/2 C. catsup  
1/2 C. honey  
Peel onions and parboil 5 to 8 minutes. Drain and place in oiled casserole. Sprinkle with salt and pepper to taste. Mix catsup and honey and pour over onions. Cover and bake at 300° for about an hour.

**CABBAGE WITH CHEESE SAUCE**  
1 small head cabbage  
2 Tbsp. margarine  
2 Tbsp. flour  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1 cup milk  
1/2 C. grated cheese  
Buttered crumbs  
Remove outer leaves from cabbage. Cut cabbage into small pieces and cook in a small amount of salted water until just tender (about 5 minutes). Melt margarine in a saucepan and blend in flour and seasonings. Stir in milk and cheese and cook over low flame until the mixture begins to thicken. Arrange cabbage and sauce in layers in an oiled casserole. Top with buttered crumbs and brown in 400° oven.

**BEETS WITH ORANGE SAUCE**  
2 Tbsp. grated orange rind  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. paprika  
1 Tbsp. water  
2 Tbsp. lemon juice  
4 Tbsp. margarine  
1/2 C. orange juice  
1/2 tsp. cooking oil  
1 Tbsp. cold water  
Cooked beets  
Heat first five ingredients. Add margarine and orange juice, mix with cold water and stir into hot mixture. Cook over low flame, stirring until mixture thickens. Continue cooking 12 to 15 minutes. Add beets to sauce and reheat.

**MEXICAN CORN**  
2 C. canned corn  
2 Tbsp. chopped green pepper  
2 Tbsp. chopped pimiento  
1 Tsp. Worcestershire sauce  
Salt and pepper to taste  
1 C. soft bread crumbs  
1 Tbsp. margarine  
1 egg  
1 C. milk  
Mix first five ingredients. Arrange alternate layers of the corn mixture and crumbs in an oiled baking dish, making top layer of crumbs. Dot each layer of crumbs with bits of margarine. Beat egg well and add milk. Pour this over the corn mixture. Bake, uncovered, at 350° for 25 to 30 minutes.
