COMPTON COLLEGE PROFESSOR GIVES MARRIAGE LECTURE

Dr. Albert J. Lovelady of Compton College presented the third and final lecture in the Marriage Course conducted by the YWCA last Thursday evening.

"Love is a matter of growth, the result of satisfying experiences," Dr. Lovelady stated, "and hate is a number of experiences that have been unsatisfying. Divorce is the result of unhappy relationship."

"At the present time in the United States there are more divorces than marriages, and 90 percent of delinquent children come from broken homes. Of the 22 civilizations in the history of the world, seven remain. Since desecration of marriage has always been an outstanding contributing cause to the downfall of civilization, it may be assumed that marriage helps to keep civilization together. Today America stands at this critical crossroad."

We are living in a day of enlightenment, Dr. Lovelady said, and there is no reason for anyone's going into marriage without a knowledge of what it means.

"Men should realize the importance of being head of their house; women should know how to care for their home and children. Both should realize the importance of their vows before God and to each other and should realize that they are marrying for life," he added.
