'On the Air' **Radio KFERN Operated** by **Sixth Graders**

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

This is the first time in the seven-year history of Dis-trict operation that continu-ous pumping along the 242-mile main Metropolitan aque-duct has been necessary to meet vaster needs," Hinds said. "Bemands for Colorado river water have gone up 100 per cent during the past year." District pumps have pushed 58 billion gallons of Colorado river water to cities along the coast extending from Santa Monica as far south as San Di-ego. San Diego has been com-pletely dependent upon Colorado River water for its expanding needs since it made its aque-duct connection in December of last year.
