Ideco Parent Plant Makes Profit Report

Net profit of Dresser, Inc Cleveland, Ohio, for the con pany's fiscal year ended Oct. 3 1948, will reach approximatel \$8,000,000, as compared with \$4 439,189 for 1947, according to the company's fourth quarte Letter to Shareholders mad public today. The 1948 net profit, according to the report, will be equivalent to slightly more than \$7,00 per company share.

Sales for 1948 will total abo \$110,000,000 in comparison \$80,095,199 for 1947.

According to President H. N. Mallon, Dresser's 13 companies—including International Derrick & Equipment of Torrance—operated at close to capacity and many companies required additional equipment and working capital during the past year.

"The figures do not illustriat the extent to which a growin business requires more workin capital," Mallon stated.
