

Supply Firm 25 Years Old

The Floyd Stationery Com-pany, which supplied most of the office furniture for the new home of The Torrance Herald, home of The Torrance Herald, was established more than 25 years ago in San Pedro. The firm's facilities now include a warehouse for storage of office furniture in addition to a type-writer repair shop.

Enlarged three times, the firm was established June 1, 1923 by William Floyd and J. A. Elchhorn. Since Mr. Floyd's death in 1933 the business has been operated by Elchhorn.

Public Library Has Had Four Homes Here

Torrance's first public library was set up in the home of Mrs. Isabel Sarah Torrance Henderson, in her home on Gramery avenue, in 1913. Mrs Henderson, mother of the city's present librarian, Mrs. Dorothy H. Jamieson, was a cousin of Jared Sidney Torrance, rounder of the city, who gave the first books from his personal collection.

The library expanded into a school building on Cabrillo avenue and later was moved across from the Dominguez Land Corp. offices on El Prado. The third location was in the 1300 block on El Prado which was later used by Boy Scouts as a meeting place and since has been torn down to make way for a parking lot. The present home of the library was completed in 1366 at a cost of, \$32,000. The local k-brary is maintained as a braach of the 26-year-old county library system.
