Torrance Part of Land Grant Made to Juan Jose Dominguez

Ownership of California lands by the same family for 148
years—until the direct line of that family is extinct—is a record. It is held by land in Northwest Torrance which, at the time

Granted to Juan Jose Domin guez, in 1788 by Governor Pe dro Fages in the name of the king of Spain, this was a portion of the 43,179 acres which included the present sites of Torrance, Compton, Redon de Geach, San Pedro, Wilmington and Gardena.

The Dominguez "San 'Pedro" grant was one of three made south of Tehachapi by the Spanish 'king through his governors, the others being the Nietos granf, embracing all land between the Santa Ana and. San Gabriel rivers, from the foothills to the ocean, and the Verdugo grant, embrant, from the left bank of the Los Angeles river to Arrene Son Sangeles river to

Little is known about Juan Jose Dominguez. He must have been a soldler, because these grants were usually made but some military service, but other than the fact of this grant and of his subsequent death, about 1822, history records no date with respect to

By the time of his death California had passed from Spanish to Mexican rule, and Governor de Sola, acting under authority of the Mexican government, renewed the grant to his brother, Cristobal Dominsuez, who was probably his successor in interest under Spanish law.

widow and six children—Victoria, Manuel, Nasario, Helena, Marcelina and Pedro. Before the courts had acted on the estate, some of the heirs made a conveyance, dated *Dec. 22, 1854. to Benjamin B. Final decree in the suit wa entered Sept. 14, 1855, in whie Manuel, having purchased the interests of some of his briters and sisters, received about 4,000 of the 43,179 acres, the balance being allotted to Pedra and the nephews and nieces.

It was the share receive by Manuel which was the foundation of the old Domingues estate. This sterling Dor who was born in San Dieg Jan. 26, 1803, saw Californiu in der the flags of Spain Mexico and the United States and was bore of the few pron linent native Californians whe although holding a position of neutrality in the struggle, at unally favored the Americans.

Married in Los Angeles in 1827 to Maria Engracia Cota 1827 to Maria Engracia Cota Don Manuel was a member o the Los Angeles Ayuntamient (City Council) in 1823, and 1829 He was First Alcalde and Judg in 1829, Second Alcalde in 1838 First Alçalde again in 1842, and was appointed Prefect—highes office under the Mexican government—in 1843.

Under American rule Manue was a delegate to the constitutional convention at Montere which drafted the first constitution of California in 1849, and in 1854 he was elected a County Supervisor.

He died Oct. 11, 1882, leating an estate of approximatel \$400,000. Bach of his six daughters was awarded \$5 in his withe balance of the estate bein left to his widow. On her deat March 16, 1883, it was fount that she had made her will of the same day as her husban but was not as generous t ward her daughters, for odolar each was awarded the with the balance of the estate to be given to her had.

Inasmuch as this made her litestate, one-sixth of the estate was allotted to each daughter. One of these was Mrs. An Josefa Domingued de Guyer, while others were Mrs. Susana del Amo and Mrs. Francis.

The de Guyer property forme the basis for the Domingue Estate Company, and it we from this corporation that Jare Sidney Torrance and his associates purchased the Torranc tract, while the del Anno an Francis properties included har now within the city, but the somewhat to the west.

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
