Printed on its brittle pages were the advertisements of June 16, 1932 and a few news items that are likely to lead the reader back along memory lane. For instance: Bacon was being sold at Grubb's Market for 16 eents a pound-sliced for 19 cents. Rabbits, fresh dressed, were 26 cents a pound. Nucoa was on the shelves of the Safeway. Stores at two pounds for 25 cents. Pure cane sugar was being sold at five pounds for 17 cents.
