The two specially-constructed, all-steel buses will be seen soon in the course of the caravan's itinerary in Southern California.

State's Own Freedom Train Starts Feb. 4

California's Historical Caravan, this state's own "Freedom Train," will open its two-year, statewide tour in Southern California on Feb. 4, carrying the story of the "Golden State" to every citizen.

Assembled by the California Centennials Commission as a key feature of its three-year commemorative program, the Caravan consists of a priceless collection of original documents and objects that highlight four centuries of California's colorful history.

Ranging from a brass plate Sir Francis Drake placed on California's shores in 1579 to the gold spike that linked the first transcontinental railroad, fourteen panels cover chronological periods in this state's destiny. Leading historians assembled these items to display as a unit for the first time. More than 20 universities, museums, libraries, official archives and private individuals from various parts of the country have contributed.

Two specially constructed steel buses, designed to form a single display unit when being viewed by the public, carry the treasures. An around-the-clock detail of state police is assigned to safeguard the exhibit.

Official starting point of the planned itinerary is Newhall on Feb. 4, 5, 6, followed by Palmdale, Lancaster, Mojave, Bar-

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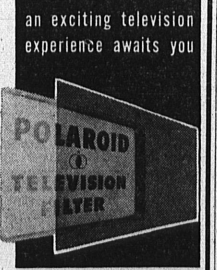
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
