Honors Again Achieved by Hospital Here

Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial Hospital has again been placed on the list of 3150 hospitals approved by the American College of Surgeons, it was disclosed this week.

While this rating is significant, it is particularly so in the 1948 ratings because a new point-rating system was applied for the first time last year "in an attempt to obtain a certain amount of precision in evaluating hospitals," the announcement said.

Emphasis is placed on the quality of professional services and care of the patient. Fundamental principles include such things as the modern physical plant, a clearly-defined organization, adequate and efficient personnel and accurate and complete medical records.
