Men's Shirts Pose Problem For Shoppers

If men's shirts are on your shopping list, pay particular heed to the collars.

Some men like their collars starched, and some like to wear them soft. Some collars can be starched, but others were never designed to undergo a stiffening treatment, says the American Institute of Laundering.

Take, for instance, soft shirts with "slotted" collars. They are the kind with a small slit or slot on the under side of the collar. Stays are often inserted in such collars to hold them in place. But it sometimes happens that the stays are taken out shortly after purchase by the wearer. And the shirt is sent to the laundry with the request that starch be applied. Unfortunately, when this is done an unsatisfactory finish often results.

It is the way the coliar is constructed inside with extra thickness and rows of stitching which produces poor results when this kind of coliar is starched. The starch does not distribute evenly through the fabric, and the imprint of the stitching and reinforcements on the underside of the fabric show up on the surface of the coliar during the ironing process.
