### **D.A.'s Office Supports Carr's New Decision**

The D.A.'s representative said he could not, in the interest of justice, divulge at this time the reasons that convinced Carr that Lubin was not one of the two thugs who beat him in San Pedro In May of 1948. He said, however; "Mr. Carr has not been coerced into this as some people may be tempted to believe. His position in the community is in-dication enough that he would fetuse any "offer" from Lubin or anyone else to withdraw his complaint if it were true. "If we were to divulge all the reasons that indicate that Lubin was not the guilty arty, it would make it difficult, if not impossible, to apprehend those who are really guilty," he said.

those who are really guilty," he said. He pointed out two factors that tended to excorreate Lubin. 1. Lubin claims he was at Lake Arrowhead at the time of the beating and can produce 12 witnesses to prove the fact. 2. Lubin is extremely near sighted and must wear extraor-dinarily thick lens glasses. Carr stated the men who beat him him did not wear glasses. Carr told Sten he could not proceed with the prosecution of Lubin as long as there remained (Continued an Page 2)
