would be filled to capacity if materials were dumped into the 30-foot excavation without being burned.

He said that some other means of disposal—probably cut and fill—would have to be instigated immediately. A proposal for a community incinerator has received some consideration, he said. This plan whereby several communities make use of a community owned burner has met with some degree of success in communities where the installation has been made, he claimed. However, he pointed out, that the installation is costly both initially and on an operating basis.

He estimated it would take considerable time before a satisfactory incinerator could be designed and built.

Trial Set for 13 Nabbed in Gambling Raid

Court trial of 13 out-of-town defendants on gambling charges arising out of a raid early Friday morning at a 2013 Pacific Coast highway hall has been set for May 24 at Gardena Justice Court.

The 12 men and one woman pleaded not guilty at the preliminary hearing which took place the following morning.

Seized at the raid at the local hall, where according to Capt. Carl H. Pearson, chief of the sheriff's vice detail, the games had been going on for "some time" were three poker tables and stacks of chips.

Pearson said his office had information that several players at Gardena poker clubs, permitted to operate under city ordinance, had been going elsewhere to continue their games when the Gardena clubs closed in the morning.

At 4 a.m. Friday Pearson, and his men, armed with heavy sledges, crashed in the entrance of the Lomita hall and arrested Marvin T. Bryant, 34, a former boxer.

Pearson stated that games were played for high stakes at the location and that the hall was equipped with a payoff cage. He said that the players were allowed to cash in their chips before being booked. Average payoff was \$150, Pearson stated. He added that it was the second raid that had been staged at the Lomita location.

Besides Bryant, 30, Bryant's wife, Mrs. Devada W. Bryant, 30, 512 W. Redondo Beach boulevard, Gardena, was also arrested.

Others booked on gambling charges after the raid included: Harry Chudacoff, 3107 So. Grand ave., Los Angeles; Joseph N. Drisdale, 2574 No. Beachwood dr., Hollywood; Igor C. Rovaditto, 15516 So. Eucalyptus, Bell.

State Grants P.V. Water Rate Increase

The new rates will be based on a \$2 minimum for 400 cubic feet or less. The company expects \$51,000 increased revenue annually.

Dear Sirs:

Several newspapers printed news stories about the anti-union picketing program I put on Easter Sunday at 25925 So. Western Ave. One paper stated that I "railed" against the unions (including the A.F.L. Bartenders' Union) and others stated that I "loosed a torrent of diatribe." Some readers may have interpreted these descriptions as being in the nature of propaganda and not fully in accord with facts and truth, though dictionary meanings and synonyms do not so indicate. Newspaper accounts also stated that I did considerable "sermonizing."

Nearly all the "railing and torrents of diatribe" I used in "sermonizing" to the pickets, the public and to the union bosses was either read or quoted directly from the Bible. I think most ministers of the Gospel, Sunday School teachers, church officials and leaders are somewhat delinquent for not more often and more forcefully preaching and quoting these portions of both the old and new Testament that pertain to applying morality, brotherly love, justice and religion to business and labor relations. The principal reason why we have so many social, moral, economic, political and labor relations problems is that the advice and instruction of the Bible is almost wholly ignored and there are almost no so-called "statesmen" or church leaders or "Democrats" (so-called and self-styled) demanding that the ethics and morality of the Bible be used as the basis for solving and adjusting our problems and disagreements.—Weaver H.
