



HERE'S ANNUAL BUDGET FOR FAMILY OF FOUR


The annual budget requirement for a family of four living in this area is \$4500, according to the John Randolph Haynes and Dora Haynes Foundation, 2324 South Figueroa street, in a statement issued recently. The foundation has just completed a survey based on con-sideration of the special factors determining the cost of living in Southern California. The survey also dealt only with those clements which it regards as essential to the welfare of the family.

The survey took cognizance of the fact that people living in other parts of the country. On the basis of prices obtained from 600 stores, the foundation concluded that the food bill for a family of four would cost \$411; housing \$515; medical, dental, and eye care would cost \$411; housing \$515; medical, dental, and eye care tould cost \$400. Lacking this amount of money, the family either would incur debt or live on a level below requirements for normal living, the report stated. In either case, the result would be inimical to the best interests of society.
