Summer Courses Open to Adults; Minors at THS

Subject to sufficient enrollment, a total of 15 daytime courses will be offered in summer classes to be held at Torrance High School, announced Principal John Steinbaugh.

The summer session is open to both regular high school students and adults. No fee is charged.

Registration for the six-week session must be completed on or before 8 a.m. next Monday, the opening day, said Steinbaugh.

High school credit may be applied for after completing the two-hour long, five-day-a-week classes. The summer session will end July 22, allowing vacation time for high school students prior to the opening of regular school on Sept. 12.

Courses to be offered include first year algebra, general mathematics, plane geometry, ninth grade English, 10th grade English, 11th grade English, typewriting, advance dictation, music, orientation, civics, U. S. history, review course in arithmetic fundamentals, and review course in reading fundamentals.

Scouting . . . Around . . .

Representing almost all of the Torrance Troops, a group of local scouts are planning to take the famous Silver Moccasin Hike through the Angeles National Forest in an effort to really 'Put the Outing in Scouting.'

This group of young men, all junior officers in their Troops, will leave Torrance on Saturday June 11th and return the following Saturday, June 18th.

The Silver Moccasin Hike is a rugged pack trip, some 65 miles in length running through the San Gabriel Mountains from the town of Sierra Madre to Scout Camp Pepperdine, near Big Pines. The trail was laid out by Boy Scouts of America as a pioneering hike to give the scouts of this area some practical experience in wilderness camping. The trail skirts the base of Mount Wilson through Little Santa Anita Canyon, crosses the San Gabriel River, passes through Big Tujunga Canyon to Charlton Flats, borders the Angeles Crest Highway to its end, and then climbs over Mount Williamson and Mount Baden-Powell to end at Camp Pepperdine on Jackson Lake.

Note: This group from Torrance will be headed by Bob Maxfield, author of this column and Assistant Scoutmaster of Troop 241. Second in command will be Gary Dawson, Patrol Leader of the Lion Patrol, Troop 241. Others attending will be William Bloomfield, Troop 721, Robert Richmond, Sea Scout Ship 213-S, and John Souza, Troop 219.

As this is the first group to go over the trail this season, several service projects are being undertaken. The first of these is the posting of the Silver Moccasin Trail. Through the cooperation of the U.S. Forest Service, an official Silver Moccasin sign has been designed, and these will be placed by this group along the trail for the convenience of those who follow.

The trail also will be cleaned up by this group for the Forest Service, and in addition to this, portions of the trail will be mapped. Due to construction work on the Angeles Crest Highway, a detour must be made in the trail. This portion also is to be posted and mapped.

The principal purpose of this trip is to give the junior officers of the Torrance troops some experience in wilderness hiking and camping, and to acquaint them with the trail so that they may take their own troops over it at some future date. In addition to this, the trip has been planned as a training hike to give instruction in mapping, compass work, reading and use of topographical maps, hiking methods, packing, and general woodcraft. Each boy will serve as hikermaster for at least one day, during which he will have charge of every phase of the day's activities. The members of the group will carry all of their own food on their backs.

They will gain invaluable experience in outdoor living and truly will discover the high adventure that is Scouting.

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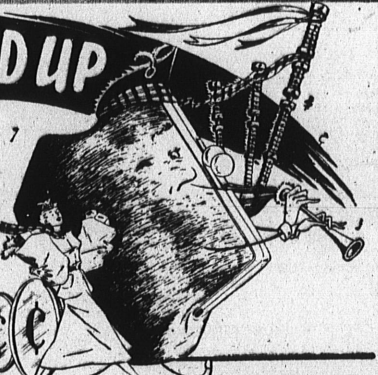
