SEND ANOTHER DOLLAR THEME FOR RED CROSS OVER-THE-TOP CAMPAIGN

Infant twins—Penny and Susan Sullivan—whose lives were saved by Red Cross blood rushed to Children's Hospital and transfused into their tiny veins at birth. . . .

Jennie Sue Robinson, aged 9, who is kept alive by transfusions given every 21 days with Red Cross supplying the blood. Mrs. Paul Guerra, ever so thankful for the Red Cross blood which saved the life of her 15-month-old daughter, Theresa, when she needed a transfusion to combat a rare anemia condition. . . .

Mrs. Betty Zachary, alive today because Red Cross was able to speed four pints of a rare type blood to her hospital bedside following an emergency operation. . . .

These appreciative folks who owe their lives to the American Red Cross today were organized into the Committee of the Living, to spearhead a "Send Another Dollar" campaign aimed to put the Los Angeles chapter "over the top" in its 1949 fund drive for a minimum goal of \$2,184,000.

Speaking for the Committee—which has volunteered its services to Drive Chairman Clarence S. Beesmyer—Mrs. Zachary declared:

"We owe our lives—or the lives of our loved ones—to the Red Cross. We want to keep it strong so that it will be ready to serve the thousands of others who will turn to it for help—
