Boy of 8 May Now Join Cubs

After September 1, a boy may join the Boy Scouts of America as a Cub when he is eight instead of nine, and the age level of the other two Scouting groups also will be lowered one year, according to a statement made today by Arnold C. Sorenson, Scout Executive of the Los Angeles Area Council which includes this community.
According to Mr. Sorenson, the

change means that boys in the movement will be Cubs from eight years to 11, Boy Scouts from 11 to 14, and Explorers from 14 to 18. All boys in the senior Scouting program will be known as Explorers, whether they remain in their own group or join another, which is not required.

Moose Lodge to Start on Clubhouse

Construction of a clubhouse for the local lodge of the Loyal Order of Moose is expected to begin within 45 days, officials of the organization indicated this week.
Plans for the Spanish-type structure, to be built on a lot at Date and Carson streets, are now with an architect and are expected to be completed and approved shortly.

The 45x100-foot structure is to contain a meeting hall, clubroom, refreshment counter, kitchen, office, conference room, lobby and storage spaces. Parking areas are to be located on two sides of the building.
Volunteer labor and material is expected to be utilized to a great extent in the building of the clubhouse, estimated value of which was placed at about \$50,000. The group currently makes its headquarters at 1915 West Carson street.

Membership Divisions Set In By HEC

To facilitate the negotiation, execution and performance of collective bargaining agreements, the Harbor Area Employers' Council has set up two membership divisions according to Frank S. Selover, executive secretary.
One is the mercantile division, which includes ready-to-wear and specialty shops, hardware, plumbing, paint, floral shops, drug stores, jewelry stores, furniture stores, and similar enterprises.
The second is the food division, which includes all food markets, grocery stores, produce stores, meat markets and similar food outlets.
Each division will have an executive committee of three members to advise with the Board of Directors, it was pointed out.

"Although divided for the purpose described, the membership of the corporation otherwise shall function as a unit, administered by the Board of Directors," the executive secretary said. It is intended, he declared, that the Board of 11 directors shall be nearly representative of the various classes of business as possible. The present board of seven members will be expanded to 11, with representatives of the food division, the directors have decided.

"In its effort to bring about permanent industrial peace in the harbor area, the board has concluded that the Council will be better able to serve its members by grouping the members according to common interests," Selover said.

It was announced, also, that due to the fact that his work requires almost continued absence from this area, W. G. Hooker, of the California office of S. H. Kress & Co., Los Angeles, has resigned from the board. The chain variety stores will be represented on the board by C. L. Brown, of the Pacific Coast office of J. J. Newberry Co.
