The Automobile Club of Southern California today listed some 40 such precautions that acation-bound motorists should heed to assure themselves of an enjoyable, carefree trip.

GOING AWAY? TELL THE COPS, NOT BURGLARS

Unless you like to come home to a porch-full of old news, papers, a forest of milk bottles (soured) and a ransacked house, here are a few suggestions of what to do before leaving on your vacation. Under home precautions, vacationists are advised to tem-porarily stop deliveries of newspapers, milk and ice; shut off water, gas, lights and refrigerator; discontinue telephone and, laundry services; Provide for an other services.

porarily stop deliveries of newspapers, milk and ice; shut off water, gas. lights and refrigerator; discontinue telephone and, landry services; Provide for care of pets, garden and mail handling or forwarding; discourage prowlers by securely locking windows and doors, drawing shades only part way down and advising neighbors of absence; ascertaining that adequate fire and theft insurance is maintained. Regarding car precautions, the club recommends complete motor checkups by competent mechanics in advance of all trips over 500 miles. Prevacation lubrication and oil changes should also be provided for in addition to thorough tire and brake checking, the club said. Under personal prevautions, yacation-bound motorists are advised to first check the validity of such essentials as drivers lieenses, car registrations, gasoline credit cards and fire per-mits or hunting and fishing licenses, if needed. Motorists should follow well-planned itheraries, the club side, personal precise as travelers checks, vacuum bottles, eameras, film, sun glasses, tollet articles, first-aid kits and dequate clohing should be checked in advance of trips as all of these items are desirable for pleasant vacationing, the club divisid.
