COLORADO WATER FLOWS INTO AREA

The first Colorado River water to flow into the Palos Verdes Water Co. system and reservoir under an agreement with the West Basin Municipal Water District, started Monday afternoon when officials opened a large valve and started an electric pump.

Flowing at the rate of 2000 gallons per minute, the water is destined to reach the homes of many of the local residents who now receive water supplies through the Palos Verdes Co. Present to inaugurate the inaugural flow were W. C. Farquhar, director of the West Basin District; August H. Riess, treasurer of the district; R. W. Pritchard, secretary, and Ben Haggott, president of the Palos Verdes Water Co.

Haggott said that the supply was doubly welcome and that he was very pleased that it was possible for his company to work with the West Basin group in arranging the contract for Colorado River water.

Flower Show Entry Blanks Being Mailed

Entry blanks, detailing thousands of dollars in cash prizes and trophies, are being mailed this week to Southland horticulturists and flower fanciers for the third annual midsummer Long Beach Flower Show, Aug. 4-7. It was announced recently.

A record number of entries is expected, according to R. G. J. Priddy, president of Pacific Flower Shows, Inc., nonprofit sponsors of the show, who urged all prospective entries to register as soon as possible.

The show's headquarters, 6138 Ora Ave., Long Beach 5.

No entry fee will be charged. The first floor of the Long Beach Municipal Auditorium is being readied for the show and will provide an extensive, but compact, display of the two floor divisions listing 690 class entries in 111 sections, according to Hudson.

adequate to supply the demand, and are drying up rather rapidly," he commented. "This critical situation will now be alleviated by the safety factor of water from the district. The water will continue to flow at the 2000 gallon per minute rate for an indefinite period, and is expected to provide plenty of safety factors for the present load of the water company.

Dear Mr. Editor:
In your last issue of the Torrance Herald, July 6, there appeared an article about the Child Care Centers of Torrance. In the article it was stated that the Centers, the Nursery and Extended Day Care, were entirely supported by California state funds. This is a mistake, unintentional of course, but it gives us parents an opportunity to better explain the purposes of the Centers. Many people have the wrong impression.

During the war the Child Care Centers were organized by the Federal Government so that mothers, who ordinarily had to stay home with their children, could work and help bring the Peace. After the war the Federal Government released them to the states wherein they were located.

In California a need was shown for the Continuation of these Centers and Congress passed a bill appropriating funds for their Aid. This bill was and still is, temporary and must be acted upon each year.

Many citizens and civic organizations lend assistance in these campaigns and the Parents Association for Child Care acknowledges gratitude.

However, the funds appropriated do not entirely pay for their subsistence. The parents also contribute, and their contributions are determined by their incomes. Those eligible are widows and widowers, parents whose incomes are below a certain level, doctors, nurses, veterans attending schools, and others who show the need.

In Torrance, the Centers are located at 2091 Marina avenue, are over 50 per cent self-supporting. Some parents pay full support for their children. But, since facilities limit the number of children that can be cared for, those who most need it are given preference.

In closing, one of the Torrance Parents Association for Child Care, wish to request the publication of this letter. We feel the public should have a true prospective of the conditions involved.

Attack Claims Victim While Square Dancing

Efforts of firemen proved futile Monday night to revive a Compton resident who collapsed while square dancing at the civic auditorium.

The victim, Albert Smith, 52, of 1333 Glenco boulevard, Compton, collapsed Monday evening at 10:10 p.m. at the Civic Auditorium and was pronounced dead shortly afterwards by doctors at Harbor General Hospital, according to investigating officers Sgt. Willard Haslam and Patrolman Hyman Fischer.

He apparently died of a heart attack, doctors said.

Gene Walker, Torrance Fire Department engineer, also attending the dance, attempted to revive Smith and called for aid from the Fire Department.

Capt. Gordon Northington, Engineer Walter West, and Fireman Don Minor arrived with an inhalator, but also were unable to revive Smith.

Smith was taken to Harbor General Hospital by Sullivan's Ambulance. He operated a cleaning business in Compton.
