**'Best Friend' Crushed to Death In Auto Mishap**

A dog, constant companion of his master for seven years, was crushed to death late Tuesday night. The car in which it was riding skidded and turned over seven times on Pacific Coast Highway, near Walters.

**MONTEBELLO GETS LEVER SOAP PLANT**

Hopes for the long-heralded local establishment of a \$25,000,000 Lever Brothers soap and food products plant, vanished yesterday when a company spokesman announced that location of the modern factory would be in the Montebello district.

Refusal of the Torrance site by Lever Brothers was said to have stemmed from muddled land-use understandings between the Santa Fe Railroad, proposed site owners, and the City of Torrance.

Railroad and city officials are currently studying the advisability of opening of corridor for residential development between the original civic center and new home development to the west.

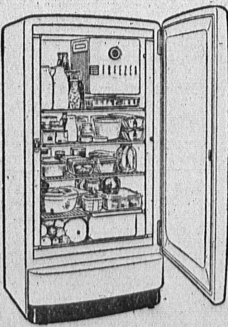

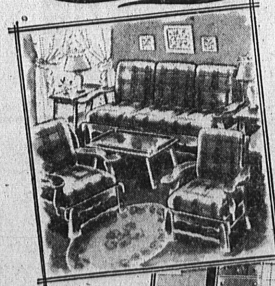

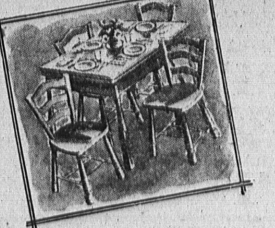
