Blinking, beliringing signals, designed to warn motofists of the approach of a train, have been installed at the Santa Fe crossing at Cabrillo avenue and at Crenshaw boulevard.

Installation of the warning devices came late last month after months of investigation and research by Santa Fe and eity officials and the Torrance Archamber of Commerce. The railroad and the city shared in the cost of the project.

The Crenshaw boulevard crossing became the subject of public attention in October of 1947 when Adrian Tatum, 22, was injured when the motorcycle on which he was riding collided with a train.
