

According to a report sub-mitted is the Torrance City Board of Education on Tuesday hight, during the fourth school month 131 home visits were made by the attendance officer. Many of these calls were made necessary by the number of pe-diculosis (head lice) cases ex-cluded from school. At the end of each school month a special effort is made to check on ai-sent pupils so that teachers may mark their registers prop-erly. F. A. Applegate, attendance of-ticer, reported: Two needy families were dis-dovered and aid secured from to school through help received. Tive children in the Pueblo district were found at home during school time without rea-son, and were taken to school. Demother, unable to get to school to register three child-dren, was taken to Perry school to make the necessary arrange-ments. homes. The report of Applegate con-cluded: "It is felt by the attendance officer that too many days of pupil attendance are being lost because of pediculosis. Aside from the income lost because of these absences, many of these cases become attendance prob-lens, and it is hard to get the pupils back in school. It is sug-gested that some thought be given by the school nurse and administrators to the possibility of handling such cases within the schools."
