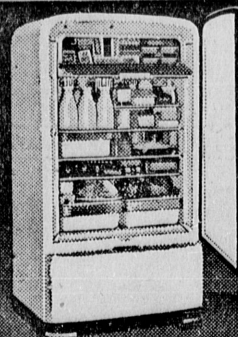

Registrations Of Voters Now Being Accepted

Registration of voters is well under way in Torrance and nearby areas.

Torrance voters have until March 4 to register for the coming municipal election April 13, City Clerk A. H. Bartlett announced this week.

Registration can now be completed at the City Hall during the hours 8 to 12 and 1 to 5, Mondays through Fridays and 8 to 12 on Saturdays. Closing date for filing of nomination papers is Feb. 13.

Persons desiring to vote by absentee ballots must submit a request for same to the City Clerk between March 24 and April 8.

Keystone voters may register now at 939 W. Carson street. It is pointed out that those who failed to vote at either of the state elections in 1946 must re-register. Also, those who have moved, changed names, become of age, become naturalized citizens and those who desire to change political affiliation must re-register.

Lions Send Milk On Good Will Ship To Europe

Torrance Lions Club was one of the first organizations responding to the appeal for donations to the California Good-Will Milk Ship being sponsored by Governor Earl Warren to carry food to the needy children of France, Italy and Greece.

The S. S. Golden Bear, which leaves Los Angeles-Long Beach harbor on Jan. 22, will carry at least six cases of condensed milk given by the local Lions, enough for 288 children for one full day. Three cases were given by the club itself and one each by John Ritchie, Nestor E. Faris and Dr. Don C. Moshos.

George H. Colburn, of Colburn's market, is handling the purchase and transfer of the milk for the Lions.

W. K. Cobb, superintendent of Redondo Union High School District and a member of the California Curriculum Commission, spoke to the club yesterday on school problems, having been introduced by Herbert E. Erwin, who is head of the Social Department of Torrance High School. Lloyd Waller, principal of Torrance High, was among the guests who included Father Patrick J. McGuinness, W. H. Murphey, H. J. Gilmore, Fred Boren, Jack E. Davis, Art Sullivan and F. A. Dobson.

MORE THAN 2000 CASES HANDLED BY POLICE HERE

Arrests for traffic violations headed the list of arrests by the Torrance Police Department during 1947, according to a report recently released.

According to the report, 1934 persons were found guilty of violating road and driving laws. Driving while intoxicated accounted for additional 82 arrests.

Other crimes handled by the Police department and the number of persons found guilty in each case included:

Murder 1, rape 4, robbery 1, aggravated assault 9, burglary 8, larceny 55, auto theft 12, other assaults 24, forgery and counterfeiting 2, embezzlement and fraud 2, carrying weapons 2, sex offenses 6, offenses against the family and children 3, liquor laws 15, drunkenness 403, disorderly conduct 105, vagrancy 5, gambling 3, parking violations 446, traffic and motor vehicle laws 1,536, and all other offenses 65.

Value of property reported stolen was fixed at \$66,307.55. Of this value, \$35,925.85 was recovered.

There were 43 automobiles reported stolen in the city, of which 26 were recovered by the

police. The local department recovered 15 autos for other jurisdictions.

An analysis of traffic accidents showed there were six persons killed in the city as a result of accidents and 88 persons injured in a total of 63 accidents involving injury. There was a total of 215 accidents resulting in property damage.

Under miscellaneous services and incidents the report showed that 20 lodgers were cared for, 2,071 persons were assisted, 121 doors were found open and reported, 81 persons were reported missing and 64 persons listed as missing were found.

The local police discovered 5 fires, 37 street lights out, investigated 22 complaints of a non-criminal nature and investigated 2 accidents not involving vehicles.

They made 16 arrests for other jurisdictions, handled nine insanity cases, investigated 12 sudden deaths, issued 357 licenses, made 554 reports affecting other departments, served 923 meals and ran up a mileage figure of 110,343 miles while on patrol and answering calls.

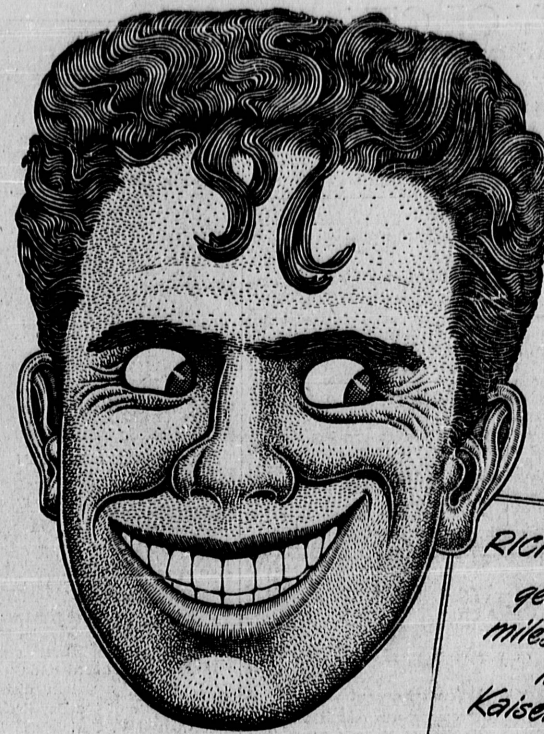
Where' The FIRE?
