benefit amount. In effect from Jan. 1, 1948, c om piete ed application forms should be mailed after the 14th day of unemployment and disa-bility except in cases when dis-ability is more than 8 but less than 14 days duration. Then the forms should be mailed immedi-ately upon recovery. Credit for the full time of disability is possible only when application forms are mailed not later than the 28th day after becoming unable to work because of a disability. 1948 application forms and in-formational booklets are avail-phe at any Department of Em.


