

**INTERIOR DECORATING PROBLEMS ARE DISCUSSED AT JUNIOR CLUB MEETING**

A lecture by Mrs. Marco Katich, representative of a San Pedro interior decorating firm, was the feature of the Torrance Junior Woman's Club first meeting of the new year, held Wednesday evening of last week in the clubhouse.

Introduced by Mrs. D. C. Moshos, program chairman, Mrs. Katich displayed many beautiful fabrics and wallpaper samples, newly released from the manufacturers.

Her suggestions, based on contemporary decor, stressed the correctness of combining all periods of design to keep home interiors from being uninteresting or overdone as to style.

The fabrics were inexpensive and Mrs. Katich remarked that effectiveness was based on originality, taste and proper color selection and not on the price of the material used.

For kitchen, bathroom and children's rooms, sturdy, gaily printed chintz was suggested, as it could be easily sponged with a damp cloth when soiled.

Her special interest in decorating children's rooms led to the presentation of many clever ideas to the clubwomen for their homes.

"Do not hesitate to consult your child as to ideas for his or her room," advised Mrs. Katich, "as it is important for them, as well as you, to be pleased with the results."

She urged that the comfort of the husband or "breadwinner" be the first consideration when planning the living room and to arrange a cozy spot for an easy chair, radio, table and lamp for the man of the house before doing anything else.

At the close of the lecture Mrs. Katich permitted close examination of the samples she had brought and answered many questions concerning the decorating problems of the ladies present.
