

Council set up the rollowing procedure for placing the new pay plan in operation: Each employee whose pre-sent rate of pay is less than the minimum of the salary range assigned to his classi-fication shall receive an in-crease in solary to the mini-mum of the range. Each employee whose pre-sent rate of pay falls within the range shall receive an in-crease in salary to the closest higher step of the range as-signed to his classification, not to exceed the maximum. Each employee whose pre-sent rate of pay exceeds the maximum of the salary range established for his class shall continue to receive such rate of nav so long as he shall

maximum of the salary range established for his class shall continue to receive such rate of pay so long as he shall remain in his present position and classification, provided, however, that any new em-ployee appointed to a position in such class shall receive the minimum or other appropriate step in the range.
