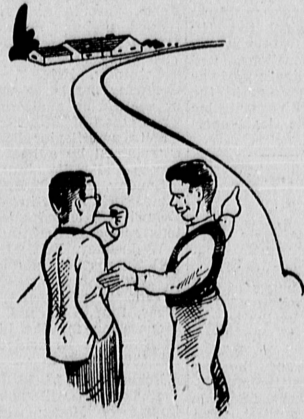
Catholic Ladies Complete Plans For Card Party

The first door prize will be drawn at 8 o'clock and games of contract and auction bridge, pinochle and 500 will be played. Refreshments will be served. Everyone is invited.

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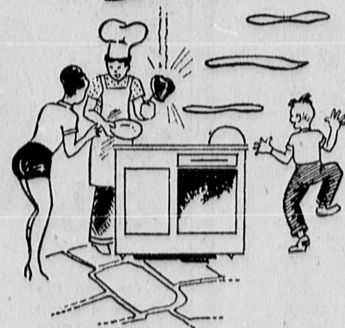
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
