Residents Of New Section To Get City Service

6. The City of Torrance will take steps to assure immediate attention to applications for telephone service in Seaside Ranchos and in the California-Nevada tract, since residents in the areas virtually are "stranded" from a communications point of view through failure of the Associated Telephone Company to install some 100 telephones for which applications have been made.

7. A site is being selected for a fire, police and street department yard, where equipment to serve the entire southwest portion of Torrance can be housed.

8. The street sweeping and cleaning situation matter is to be cleared up, probably by the substitution of a motor sweeper for the present hand-sweeping method.

9. Garbage collection and health department facilities are being extended in the area as homes are occupied.

10. Voting places for convenience of electors of the area will be provided in keeping with the growth of the areas, since the newcomers to Torrance will be entitled to vote within the City of Torrance, as soon as they have established the 30-day residence requirement in the precinct, 90 days within the county, and one year requirement within the state.

11. School problems, both new buildings and transportation, are to be handled as rapidly as children of new home owners are entered in the Torrance schools, as this is mandatory. The schools must either provide buildings or transportation for all children who have not completed high school.

12. The South Bay Humane Society, which has the contract with the City of Torrance for caring for stray animals, and which provides the pound for the City of Torrance, will be requested to add to its facilities to cover the new subdivisions.

Torrance has a 50-cent levy and Redondo Union High School District has a 25-cent extra levy authorized for this year.

14. Ambulance service is provided throughout the city for emergency calls.

15. Postal service—Every effort will be made to provide door to door postal delivery through the Torrance postoffice as soon as possible, utilizing a new substation in Southwest Torrance and another in North Torrance to assure that no delay is experienced in delivery of mail. Such a program has been submitted to the postal authorities in Washington, D. C., together with the petition of residents of the various areas who complain that to use "Gardena" or "Redondo Beach" addresses when actually they live in Torrance is illegal.

16. Water—Areas of the city, particularly in the California-Nevada, Hollywood Riviera and the proposed Seahaven Development, will be able to have Colorado River water through the Metropolitan Water Districts as soon as their bonding capacity makes possible the importation of the water from present lines which now extend to Welteria, a part of Torrance Municipal Water District No. 1.

City Administrator Stevens said: "We are aware of the requirements of the various newly developing home districts, and they will get service to which they are entitled as fast as physically possible. Torrance is growing at a rapid pace, and it takes a little time to work out such problems with the slow way in which any municipal government is required to work. All we can do is take the easy things first, and we will follow with the rest as fast as possible. We anticipate and expect the cooperation and patience of our new neighbors, the same pioneering spirit which has made America great from its very birth. Torrance is the government of the people of the community; the people are entitled to its protection and services in keeping with the tax rate which they pay. It is our duty to see that they get such protection and service."
