passed away early Friday morning were held Monday at 2 p.m. at White and Day Colonial Chapel, 901 Torrance boulevard, Redondo Beach.

Active casket bearers were Hilker Williams, Dr. Charles T. LaFrance, Clyde Marsh, Joseph

Byrne, Walter Sheehan and Mickey Elissa.

Honorary pallbearers were Logan Cotton, I. H. Hawkins, Hal Griffin, Ralph Pritchard, Arthur Nelson, Paul Thompson, Clifford Sams, Paul Arthur, Walter Harrison, Harold Williams, Carson Hubbard and John Vale.

Rev. Homer Grimes, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Redondo Beach conducted the rites. Interment in Inglewood Park Cemetery followed the services.

Scott went to Redondo Beach in 1936 and built his reputation and fortune as a real estate developer. He represented the Huntington Land Co. since 1939. Huge tracts in the area have been developed by his efforts.

Boy Scout work was close to his heart and Camp Vaughn Scott, Hollywood Riviera, was named in his honor. In his development work he was instrumental in developing the Wilshire and Rimpau districts which now the Miracle Mile of Los Angeles. He sold his interests and was associated with McCarty, Scott and Evans in projects in the western section of Los Angeles. For several years he operated an office on La Brea in Los Angeles.

Mr. Scott is survived by his widow, Lula Scott; a daughter, Mrs. Faye Moore, Los Angeles, and a sister, Mrs. Eys Black, of Los Angeles.

All the precious papers were protected by a half-inch lucite plastic shield. There was a heavy sheath of steel plate in each of the three exhibit cars to protect the papers from fire or damage.

There were 27 marine, 24 enlisted men, and three officers, to guard the famous documents. The students will be presented at an assembly for the purpose of telling the entire Junior High about their tour.

SCHOOL SPENDING LAGS

While per pupil expenditures in the schools, on the average, increased 66 per cent from 1940 to 1947, indexes of economic change show that they should have gone up 86 per cent to hold their own in the economic market.

SCHOOLS NOT EQUAL
