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King Fighting **Abandonment** Of C.G. Office

Rep. Cecil King has informed Adm. Joseph F. Farley, coast guard commandment, that he Rep. Cecil King has informed Adm. Joseph F. Farley, coast guard commandment, that he is opposed to the present plans of the Coast Guard to close the 11th Naval district office in Long Beach and that he would bring the matter to the attention of the president if necessary. King and Farley conferred for more than a half hour Friday after which King said that Farley had failed to convince him of the necessity for closing the Long Beach office.

The congressman added that he would ask the House Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee, of which he is a member, to probe the motives behind the Coast Guard's proposal.

The Coast Guard has explained that it is consolidating its various districts throughout the country and in Alaska as an economy measure. The 11th Naval district office would be consolidated with the 12th district office in San Francisco.

But King said that he couldn't see how the Coast Guard was saving any money after it had spent \$100,000 with a New York firm of management engineers to find out how it could save money in its present operations. The congressman as aid the economy survey cost more than can possibly be saved by closing the Long Beach headquarters and consolidating the two districts.

As to the guard's contention that no Los Angeles shipping functions will be affected, King targued that since the new setup will place the Long Beach office under San Francisco, "our 1 shipping will be directed by San Francisco interests."

Rep. Willis Bradley (R) of 0 Long Beach has taken an opsposite stand, stating that he r doesn't believe the elimination of the Long Beach office will's affect Coast Guard activities in Southern California.

"I hate to see the headquarters moved of course, but it is an economy move and when we take a dollar from them we can't complain when they take a nickel from us," Bradley said.
