Some teachers in our schools have had as high as fifty pupils. This is far too many pipils for a teacher and was forced upon us because of the lack of classrooms.

I think the Board has done exceed-ing the lack of funds, class-rooms and materials. The Board is far from being a "rubber stamp" Board.

Your overwhelming response to my stand on the school problems con-fronting us indicates your approval. I appreciate your offers of as-sistance, well wishes and support. If elected, I will do my best to follow through by actually representing you and your interests.

PERSONAL QUALIFICATIONS: Resident of Torrance since 1913 . . . entered first grade in Torrance and graduated from Torrance High School . . . graduated from the University of Southern California . . . practiced law in Torrance for the past 15 years . . . taught business law and real estate at Torrance Evening High School and in other communities for 10 years . . . parent, taxpayer, actively interested in civic and school problems.

HERE'S WHERE I STAND

We need new and adequate schools. I am in favor of a bond issue to finance these requirements, and will happily pay my share of their cost. But I believe the proposed \$1,500,000 bond issue is twice as large as we need at this time. (Please note that this bond issue as large as we need a ruesday's ballot. The superintend-ent of schools is planning to submit it at a special bond election in June.) If elected to the school board, I will do my best to have the proposed bond issue scaled down to a reasonable and acceptable amount.

- 2. Administrators and teachers at Torrance High School have prov-en their ability and worth to the school and to the community. I shall oppose any change in high school personnel except for cause.
- Essential needs at the high school, such as a lighted athletic field, swimming pool and gymnasium facilities, should be given attention along with school-room shortages. 4.
- Election for Board of Education members should be held when interest is greatest—that is, at our regular general municipal election. Vote NO on Charter Amendment number 1.
