Torrance embarked on a new era Tuesday night as City Clerk A. H. Bartiett administered the oath of office to three new members of the City Council, three re-elected members of the Board of Education, and certified to the results of the vote April 13 on five propositions on the ballot. Installed as members of the Souncil are George C. Powell, Job L. Haggard and Nickolas D. Drale.

Propositions declared adopted are: One permitting the removal of members of the police and fire departments for cause, ap-proved by a vote of 1515 to 1253; the one approving the climination of salarles of effy councilmen, approved by a vote of 1439 to 1435; the one separating the school elections, from the city elections, ap-proved by a vote of 1578 to 1110; one providing for the City Manager form of govern-ment permanently, approved by a vote of 1422 to 1318, and one barring permanently the licensing of draw poker par-lors in Torrance, approved by a vote of 2034 to 369.
