Chamber Endorses School Bond Issue

Endorsement of the revised \$1,504,000 school bond issue and building program, which includes an allocation of \$40,000 for improvements at the Torrance high school athletic field, was voted by directors of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce last Friday.

It was pointed out that even with the adoption of the school bond issue to be submitted June 4, the school tax would be \$2.25 or less, indicating a reduction of about 18c per \$100 assessed valuation.

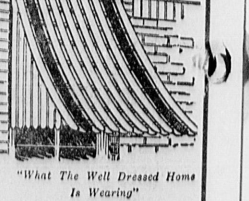
