At the Hollywood Riviera Home Owners' Association monthly meeting held Monday at the Riviera Beach Club, Commander W. M. Mason reported that of a total of 257 registered voters, 249 cast their votes—246 "yes" against 3 "noes" for the school bonds. These figures include both the Riviera and Seaside Ranches. 1901 Veterans Will Graduate From LA Schools

One thousand, nine hundred and one students who laid aside their books to take up arms in World War II will be graduated from the Los Angeles City Schools during graduation week, June 13-18, according to a report filed last week with the city Board of Education.

A total of 24,926 students will graduate from the city's 123 schools which include 30 junior high schools, 22 junior-senior high schools, 46 senior high schools, and two junior colleges. Of the 8,946 students graduating from the junior high schools, 4,175 are boys and 4,771 girls;

1,387 boys and 1,345 girls will graduate from the junior-senior high schools. In the senior high schools 5,101 boys and 5,718 girls will wear caps and

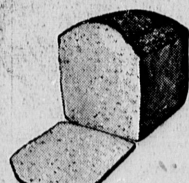
