Scrap Bought for New Steel at High Mark

The iron and steel industry consumed 20,016,000 gross tons of purchased scrap during 1947 in its various furnaces. This tonnage of purchased scrap exceeded the previous peak, set during the war in 1943, by more than 1,336,000 tons, the American Iron and Steel Institute announced today.

This record supply nevertheless was insufficient to boost steel operations above a yearly average of 93 per

cent of capacity. It is estimated that millions of tons of potential steel production have been lost since the end of the war because of insufficient supplies of purchased scrap, and the poor quality of available scrap.

Practically all steel furnaces use scrap to some extent, it was explained. The ratio of pig iron to scrap charged to steel-making furnaces may be varied somewhat, but for many grades

Railway Buys Diesel Trains

Plans for purchase of five new diesel-powered streamlined "Sunset Limited" trains, for use between Los Angeles and New Orleans, were announced today by the Southern Pacific Company.

Each train will consist of 15 cars, including baggage-mail, dormitory, four chair cars, coffee shop-lounge, diner, full lounge with barber shop and other special conveniences, and six sleepers featuring room space only.



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
