


Court Orders Clerks Union Officials To Answer Questions

Judge Clarence M. Hanson of Superior Court of Los Angeles for the third time has entered an order to certain officers of the Harbor area Retail Clerks' Union directing them to answer certain questions.

The Judge's order was issued in connection with depositions being taken from the defendants in a damage action brought by three retail merchants. Ann Lindner, union president, Dave Morgan, business agent, and Haskel Tidwell, secretary, have refused to answer a long list of questions at these depositions.

The union officers and Clerks' Local No. 905 are being sued for \$75,000 damages. Also, Judge Hanson has put into effect a preliminary injunction restraining

Steel Plants Report Wages Top Earnings

Steel companies paid out almost 50 million dollars more in wages and salaries last year than in 1946, the American Iron and Steel Institute reported today. In contrast to that increase, the companies reported that they netted only \$159,000,000 more in profits than in 1946 and they paid out \$36,000,000 more in dividends.

The comparisons are based upon reports from 52 steel companies accounting for approximately 92 percent of the industry's production of steel ingots.
