Amendments to County's **Charter Set**

Nine proposed amendments to the Los Angeles County charter will be submitted to the vot-ers at the November general elec-tions. County Counsel Harold W. Kennedy is today complet-ing drafts of the proposed changes

W. Kennedy is today competing drafts of the proposed changes.

The supervisors have until Sept. 7 to modify or withdraw the charter amendments from the general election ballot if they so desire.

Six of the proposed amendments relate to the Civil Service regulations. The remaining three proposals are medial in mature to correct conditions now taken under consideration by the charter.

One of these latter is an amendment to remove from the superintendent of charities the exclusive right to administer services to handicapped children and would give the Board of Supervisors discretion in fixing this responsibility. Many of the social service groups contend that the county health office r should supervise the Crippled Children's Act.

Another amendment would place control of the Juvenile Hall under the probation officer. The control is now in the exclusive jurisdiction of the county probation committee.

A third proposal would amend

A third proposal would amend the charter so that prohibition against a business firm or concern, that a county appointive officer might be associated with, from obtaining a contract to do business with the county be removed.
